
More Than Words: So Many Ways to Say What We Mean by Roz MacLean

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- What do you think 'communication' means?
- What do you think 'expression' means?
- Do you think communication and expression are important? Why or why not?
- Did you learn about any ways of communicating you didn't know about before?
- Was there ever a time you couldn't express yourself? How did that feel?
- Did you have a favorite way of communicating from the book? Can you think of any ways of communicating that weren't in the story?
- What are some good things to do if someone communicates in a different way than you? (hint: check back matter under 'How to help everyone have communication access')

WORKSHEET ACTIVITY

What is your favorite way to express yourself? Draw a picture and write about it too if you like.

How do you notice the people around you expressing themselves? Do you notice them doing anything other than talking? Draw a picture and write too if you like.

THUMBPRINT LEAF BOATS

Materials:

- Modeling clay / plasticine or play dough
- Card stock paper, firm construction paper. Optional to use yellow construction paper or paint a yellow background on thick painting paper.
- Drawing materials
- Tracing leaf shape templates

Instructions

Boat:

STEP 1: Roll a small piece of modeling clay into a small ball in the palm of your hands

STEP 2: Hold the ball in your palm and press your thumb from your other hand into the middle of it

STEP 3: Fold up the sides a little bit







Leaf sail:

STEP 1: Draw a leaf shape on your paper (tracing template optional). Make sure it has a pointy bottom.

STEP 2: Write a kind, fun, silly or encouraging message on the sail. Keep it short so it fits! Add lots of color around your message. Some examples are: "I like you" or "You're great" OR draw a picture on the sail of something that you really like.

STEP 3: Cut out your leaf and press the point into the middle of the boat. It should stick.

STEP 4: Boats can be shared within the class so that everyone gets a message, or kept where you can see it later (like on your desk) to give future you a smile or encouragement.

*a child with communication difficulties may want to make more than one sail with functional messages to share with peers like, "want to play?" or "want to read together?"











LEAF BOOKMARKS

Either use the leaf shape template as a tracer for children to trace and cut out their own leaves,, or they can be directly drawn on.

Draw a picture or create patterns on the leaf shape to create a vibrant bookmark.
